## “Ride to School in a Fire Engine”

### Drawing Information, Rules & Regulations

#### Eligibility

Children ages 7 through 15 who live, and attend school, in the Cities of Bellevue, Newcastle, Medina, Beaux Arts, Clyde Hill, Hunts Point, or Yarrow Point.

- 1 One entry per child.
- 2 Each child must complete his/her own entry.

#### Escape Plan Requirements

Each Home Fire Escape Plan must contain:

- 1 A map of the child's home showing all windows and doors.
- 2 Two ways out of each room in the house.
- 3 All smoke detectors on the map.
- 4 A family meeting place outside the home.

#### Entry Requirements

Entries must be submitted at the Bellevue Fire Department Open House on October 3, 2015 between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

- 1 Entries will be reviewed by a firefighter.
- 2 Completed escape plans will be returned, and the child will be entered in the drawing.
- 3 Entry into the drawing will require a name, and a phone number or email address



# How to Make a Home Fire Escape Plan

- Draw a map of your home. Show all doors and windows.
- Visit each room. Find two ways out.
- All windows and doors should open easily. You should be able to use them to get outside.
- Make sure your home has smoke alarms. Push the test button to make sure each alarm is working.
- Pick a meeting place outside. It should be in front of your home. Everyone will meet at the meeting place.
- Make sure your house or building number can be seen from the street.
- Talk about your plan with everyone in your home.
- Learn the emergency phone number for your fire department.
- Practice your home fire escape drill!
