1. **CALL TO ORDER:**

The meeting was called to order by Chair Grindeland at 6:03 p.m.

2. **APPROVAL OF AGENDA:**

Motion by Boardmember Powell and second by Vice-Chair Evans to approve the meeting agenda as presented. Motion carried unanimously (4-0).

4. **ORAL COMMUNICATIONS/PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

Ward Urion, LifeWire

1401 – 140th Pl. NE, Bellevue, WA

On behalf of LifeWire, Mr. Urion explained that the organization has been providing domestic violence services and programs to the community since 1982. LifeWire has grown to become one of Washington State’s largest domestic violence service providers and a recognized leader in the field. They work closely with local and regional human service agencies to provide life-saving and life-changing programs and services to help victims and their children separate safely from an abuser, restore trust, develop self-sufficiency, and build peaceful families.

Since LifeWire and the City’s Probation Division have a close relationship, Mr. Urion thanked the City for their continued support. He noted that the City of Bellevue has been LifeWire’s primary and most consistent funder.

Mr. Urion requested additional time on a future Park Board meeting agenda and/or with Parks’ staff to discuss further partnership opportunities with the City.

A 2014 LifeWire fact sheet was distributed during Mr. Urion’s presentation.

6. **CHAIR COMMUNICATION:**

Chair Grindeland, along with Vice-Chair Evans, attended a recent City Council meeting to accept a Proclamation declaring July 2014 as Parks & Recreation Month in Bellevue. The proclamation urged everyone to enjoy and recognize the many benefits of Bellevue’s parks and recreation facilities and programs.

In addition, Boardmember Heath discussed the research he is conducting regarding Sound Transit's maintenance facilities in Bellevue. Specifically, Boardmember Heath noted that there are three potential maintenance facilities identified in Bellevue, as opposed to one potential facility identified in Seattle. Boardmember Heath discussed the "Disparate Impact" on the community, noting that there is a high population of first born foreign generations that live in Bellevue. Boardmember Heath implied that Sound Transit may be placing unintended consequences on these citizens without the intent to discriminate. In any regard, he suggested that others may want to be mindful of this possibility as well.

8. **DIRECTOR'S REPORT:**

Mr. Foran reported that the Bellevue Collection Family 4th of July Celebration was a huge success. He commended Cherie Clayton for her efforts in planning the event along with the Bellevue Police and Fire Departments. In addition, Chair Grindeland commended Nancy Harvey and Shelley Brittingham for volunteering and assisting with the celebration.

9. **DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS:**

A. MyBellevue Mobile App

Ms. Ferguson provided an overview of the MyBellevue Mobile app project. She noted that the mobile app makes it possible for residents and workers in Bellevue to use their smart phones to enter service requests and access City news, jobs and social media easily with their phone. If a citizen notices a damaged sign or other problem within the community, they can utilize the MyBellevue app to notify the City in real time, with a photo and GPS location if desired. The app also allows someone to check for other service requests in the area and track these requests until they are addressed. MyBellevue features a home page, new requests, nearby requests, and my stuff.

Ms. Ferguson explained that the purpose of this project was to work interdepartmentally to develop a single, standardized reporting, tracking and data storage system that is simple to use, links with existing applications, provides two-way communication of information, and is capable of providing useful information management.

Ms. Ferguson noted that there are some foreign language options available for the app.

B. CIP Initiatives

Mr. Kost discussed some of the upcoming CIP initiatives at Downtown Park and Meydenbauer Bay. He noted that these projects are not new to Boardmembers but represent a significant amount of work that will occur over the next two or three years in downtown Bellevue. Both

projects are in the design phase of development. Mr. Foran added that it is one of Council's top priorities to have connectivity between Downtown Park and Meydenbauer Bay.

The following is a list of upcoming projects for the two initiatives, which were reviewed by Mr. Kost:

- Downtown Park:
 - Levy Project—the so-called “complete the circle” project
 - Sewer line replacement
 - Inspiration Playground
 - Northeast Entry (CIP budget request)

- Meydenbauer Bay Park
 - Phase 1 development
 - Recent day moorage project
 - House removal
 - Sewer line replacement

Boardmember Van Hollebeke discussed some of the Old Bellevue Merchant Association's concerns regarding the limited amount of parking spaces available near Old Bellevue/Main Street. Mr. Kost noted that the Parks Department evaluated parking and determined the parking at the Downtown Park should accommodate park users. Vice-Chair Evans discussed the significant expense associated with developing parking lots and added that the parking-related issues near Old Bellevue are a larger problem for the City, rather than the Park Board.

Mr. Foran explained that there are a number of operational ideas for parking being considered as Old Bellevue continues to get redeveloped. He added that the Park Board should focus on the Core Principles for parks and open spaces. Mr. Foran encouraged Boardmembers to focus on overall policy discussions for getting more parking spaces in Old Bellevue, rather than focusing on the Downtown Park to solve the parking issues. With this said, Boardmember Van Hollebeke encouraged Parks staff to be involved in policy discussions for parking.

Boardmember Van Hollebeke asked if there will be visible connectivity between Downtown Park and Meydenbauer Bay. Mr. Foran clarified that the circle completion in Downtown Park will include a water feature and promenade that flows toward Main Street. This natural flow will lead people toward the waterfront.

Boardmember Van Hollebeke suggested that a formalized engagement process be implemented with the Meydenbauer Bay Neighborhood Association regarding the implementation of the principles. Mr. Foran clarified that the Meydenbauer Bay Neighborhood Association has been engaged since the Transient Moorage Management Plan began. This ongoing, direct planning will continue through Phase 1. Mr. Foran added that Phase 2 of the project will be more engaging with the community and the City will want to sanction more prescriptive interactions—Phase 2 will be much more complex.

Boardmember Heath reported that construction will soon begin on the Bridle Trails Corner Park.

Boardmember Powell reported that the Downtown Livability Committee has issued their preliminary report. She encouraged Boardmembers to continue advocating for more open space within the Downtown corridor.
