**Subject:** **Public Outreach Process for Potential Parks Voter Initiative**  
(Board action requested on Draft City Council Memo)

At the June 18 meeting, City Council directed staff to proceed with planning for a potential 2008 Parks voter initiative. As part of the overall workplan, Council requested that the Parks & Community Services Board conduct a public comment process and report its findings to Council. This public comment process and the companion report will help inform City Council as it makes final decisions on election timing, project content, and funding mechanism in 2008.

Throughout the fall of 2007, the Board conducted a community outreach process that included participation at three community events, a public hearing at the November 7 meeting, and an online-survey/comment card. Combined, 558 surveys were completed and are summarized in the attached report. Staff will review these survey results at the January 8 meeting.

Also attached is a draft City Council memorandum which summarizes the overall public outreach process, key findings, and recommendation. The Board will be asked to review, edit, and approve a final communication to Council at the January 8 meeting. Once approved, this memo will be distributed to Council before they further discuss a potential voter initiative at an upcoming retreat.

**Subject:** Outreach Process and Recommendation for Potential Parks Voter Initiative

Background

Bellevue City Council asked the Parks & Community Services Board to conduct a public outreach process this fall to help determine community support for a potential parks voter initiative. As you know, Bellevue voters have approved seven parks ballot measures since the City was incorporated in 1953, with the most recent measure being the 1988 park bond. Unless a new ballot measure is approved by voters, city property taxes will not include voter-approved funding to expand the parks system for the first time in over 50 years.

Public Outreach

Based on Council direction, the Parks & Community Services Board conducted a community feedback process through the following activities:

1. Attended community gatherings, including the Robinswood Sportsfield Grand Opening (October 6), Kelsey Creek Farm Fair (October 13), and a Network on Aging meeting. Overall, board members discussed ideas for a potential voter initiative with over 200 individuals during these three events.
2. Conducted a Public Hearing at the November 7 Board meeting. Notice of the public hearing was published in the official City newspaper and all major partnership groups were notified of the opportunity to comment. Ultimately, thirteen individuals/ organizations participated: SPLASH, Bellevue Youth Theater Foundation, Bellevue Botanical Garden Society, Bellevue Senior Advisory Council, Bridle Trails Park Foundation, Surrey Downs Community Club, and representatives from several local sportsfield user groups.
3. A survey instrument/comment card was distributed at the various community gatherings and was available on the City's web site. The on-line survey was available for a two month period (October 16 to December 14, 2007), and was prominently located on the home page of the City website. The internet survey provided a valuable way to gather community input, with 332 individuals completing the on-line survey.

Combined, 558 surveys/comment cards were completed which are summarized in the attached report. While we are pleased with the overall response rate, it should be noted that this was not a random sample survey that can be interpreted to statistically represent the opinions of the entire community. Respondents were either intercepted at one of the community events or volunteered to complete the on-line survey. Despite these limitations, however, it should be noted that the results closely matched prior research findings for visitation rates (question 2), overall satisfaction (question 3), and funding preferences (question 4).

### Key Findings:

- **Overall Support.** Residents support Bellevue Parks & Community Services, and recognize the value parks and programs contribute to the quality of life in Bellevue. Overall, 94% of residents rated the overall quality of parks as “good or better” and 93% indicated that they were “likely or very likely” to support additional tax measures for parks.
- **Need for Additional Investment.** Residents understood the need to continue investing in the park system and we did not hear opposition to additional voter-approved property tax measures. Overall, the concept of replacing the expiring 1988 park bond was very popular. Our approach did not specifically address overall fiscal tolerance or preferred funding mechanisms (ie. bond vs. levy), and we recommend staff and Council conduct additional research on these issues.
- **Priorities for Additional Funding.** The survey indicates the highest support for the following project areas: protect water quality in Bellevue’s lakes and streams, preserve natural areas and open space, make sure new parks have same level of maintenance as existing parks, and complete existing parks. While development projects such as new neighborhood/community parks, sportsfield improvements, and indoor athletic facilities did not test as high, all project categories were considered “very or somewhat” important by the majority of residents. Again, it should be noted that these results are very consistent with prior research findings even though we did not conduct a statistically valid survey.
- **Citizen Comments.** The survey also provided an opportunity to provide open-ended comments on the future of the park system. While most comments related to general park acquisition and development, several themes emerged: the need for additional aquatic facilities, sportsfield improvements including all-weather surfaces, open space preservation and environmental stewardship, trails and mobility improvements, downtown park development, and indoor tennis courts. An unedited list of all survey comments is included in the attached report.

### Recommendation

The Parks & Community Services Board recommends that City Council and staff continue to plan for a voter initiative in 2008. We understand that Council will discuss this issue early this year, including the key issues of project mix, funding mechanism, and election timing. We encourage City Council to make these important policy decisions as soon as practical so the City can continue the public information and outreach process. Several individuals encouraged the City to provide information to the community as early in the process as possible, and the Parks & Community Services Board is prepared to play an active role in support of this effort.

The Parks & Community Services Board also acknowledges that the list of potential acquisition and development projects significantly exceeds funding that could come from a voter initiative alone. Given the relatively short period of time before a fall election and the inherent difficulty obtaining majority or supermajority approval, the key challenge is to develop a package that can be supported by the broader community. We encourage Council to consider the information obtained through this public outreach process and any supplemental research findings when developing this final package.

The board is excited about the prospect of continuing the history of successful parks voter initiatives in Bellevue, and is ready to support Council throughout this process.




Q5. Would you be inclined to support a property tax measure for additional park acquisition and development?

94	Parks are extremely important and used frequently by my family and friends. However, some parks are not maintained properly, i.e. paving of tennis courts and portable toilets. Also, many parks that are highly used do not even have restroom facilities. Please consider these needs. Thank you.
95	Please continue to add restrooms to parks that only have portable toilets. Very impressed by the Robinswood soccer fields. Nice, nice job!
96	Please replace play ground equipment of Kelsey Creek park. They are too old and not enough for kids to play.
97	Upkeep is important
98	Volunteer clean up crews are great ideas.
99	We recently moved here from CA and feel the high quality of the parks is a big part of the high quality of family life here. One thing that would be nice is if more organic fertilizers and such could be used. The kids are running and playing on the grass and that's a lot of exposure to dangerous chemicals.
100	Year round open restrooms
101	Consider adjacent homes in park developments.
102	Commissioner's waterway park (148th & Bel-Red) is basically useless. Cost money & maintain-we need new neighborhood park for that area of neighbors
103	Do not over develop existing or new neighborhood parks with things like restrooms, which are expensive to maintain. This is more appropriate for the larger community wide type parks.
104	Go to the Neighborhoods and develop support early and get residents to vision what an excellent Parks and Recreation District/Department can look like. Keep explaining the social, economic, community benefits of investing in our Parks and Open Spaces. Conservation and Green best work practices need to be practices within our Parks and Natural Resources Department too. Walk the Talk!!!
105	Neighborhood parks need to be maintained and not changed. People who live surrounding a park deserve to have the integrity of their homes and neighborhoods maintained.

106	Our Community (Horizon Heights) borders on Lattawood Park, one of the newer additions to the City's Park system. the park has had a very positive impact on the quality of life in the neighborhood.
107	Pocket parks are important, especelly in the high density areas
108	Two Parks plans (1993 and 2003) have identified Newport Hills as deficient in all parks metrics as efined by the city. Any park initiative must address our neighborhood and other underserved neighborhoods. If purchasing the property for Meydenbauer was so important, than the neighborhoods should be important too. Do not spend our money planning or developing that park until you have purchased propoerties in the underserved neighborhoods. Also the city should look into whether "private parks" at PUDs are appropriate. In our neighborhood this is occuring to "offset pressure" on the few parks we have. This is exclusionary. Some of these properties should have been purchased by the city, under eminent domain laws if necessary, to add to the park system. If they are allowed, they should not be visible to the excluded citizens. What is a parent to say to their child when they ask "can I play at that park?" An example of this can be found at 116th Ave and SE 64th Street.
109	Although a non-Bellevue resident, I volunteer hundreds of hours each year to the Bellevue Parks Department as well as pay non-resident fees for Parks Department services and programs. Presently, athletics, athletics facilities and athletics programs are well funded. A similar level of emphasis needs to be placed on arts programs and other programs that serve other members of the teen/youth community.
110	As a King County voter and a teacher in the Bellevue School District, I would especially like to see programs and facilities designed to support teenagers and their interests through after school and summer programs.
111	If funding is secured, it is most important to develop/improve parks, after school programs and indoor recreation in lower income areas than in middle and upper income areas.
112	Bellevue has a lot of beautiful parks already. However, as the only public tennis facility on the eastside, I would like to see additional courts built at Robinswood Tennis Center. In addition, the parking there is in dire need of improvement.
113	Consider funding for more indoor courts at Robinswood. There is a huge need!
114	I play tennis 3 - 4 times per week at the Robinswood Tennis Center. It appears to be used by young and old - and is always busy. It is one of few public indoor tennis centers in the area and runs wonderful programs for adults and kids. They need more indoor courts to better accomodate residents that want to enjoy tennis year round in an often rainy environment. thanks!
115	IF this would be a continuation of the present tax, I would definitely support. Parks are very important. Parking at Robinswood tennis facility is HORRIBLE. Please do something about this. Many tennis users have to park on the nearby streets. It would help if SUV drivers could learn how to park, but since that is unlikely and would not solve the problem anyway, please create more parking. The space is available, it just has to be opened so the tennis players can use it.
116	More indoor tennis courts at Robinswood facility, or another Bellevue location. Tennis is a sport that serves all age groups for kids to seniors.
117	Please consider building more indoor tennis courts at Robinswood Tennis Center. This is an outstanding facility with a top-notch coaching staff - so outstanding that the demand far exceeds what the facility can support. Building more courts will allow Robinswood to continue in excellence as a highlight to the Bellevue Parks offerings for Bellevue residents as well as people from all over Seattle and the Eastside.
118	Put in indoor tennis courts at Lewis Creek Park. The closest indoor facility is way over at Robinswood. I think the Lakemont area would benefit from having indoor courts close by.

119	Recently discovering tennis lessons at your Robbinswood Tennis Center, I have been very happy with the quality of lessons, but dissappointed at the availability of courts for practice. I believe the Roibbinswood Tennis Center would better serve the new and veteran tennis players by providing more covered courts for play.
120	The indoor tennis facility at Robinswood is so highly used that we need to expand more indoor courts for players. It is so difficult to get indoor courts during the day in the Fall & Winter, it would be wonderful if Bellevue park plans to increase the number of indoor tennis courts for the residence,after all, this is the rainy Pacific Northwest. Thanks for considering.
121	The Robinswood Tennis Center classes are filled right away, often with wait lists or disappointed people who did not get a class spot. There is need for expansion of this facility or adding another tennis facility in Bellevue to accomodate the large numbers of residents of all ages who play tennis regularly. Adult tennis players in particular are under served, the availability of court time and classes does not come close to meeting the needs of Bellevue residents.
122	We need more indoor tennis courts!! Robinswood tennis center is bursting at the seems - demand for classes and teams is very high! More indoor public courts are desperately needed to keep up with the demand of this ever growing sport.
123	we use the indoor tennis facility at Robsinswood and demand seems very high so would it make sense to build another indoor tennis facility? Also, since you charge to use indoor tennis courts and there is income from lessons, etc.. that should offset the construction/maintenance expense.
124	Vuemont/Lakemont has a new baseball or soccer field (across from the fire station) but there appears to be plenty of room to add a new and much needed indoor tennis and swimming pool facility. Please consider this as it would alleviate the over-crowding at Robinswood.
125	1. I use paved and unpaved trails in the City of Bellevue daily for transportation (walking/biking) and recreation. These facilities should be connected where possible, as they encourage people to walk/bike/use the bus. 2. I support the acquisition and development of parks on Lake Sammamish. It's too bad so many opportunities here were lost long ago.
126	If the BNSF railway right-of-way is purchased by the County, please provide funding to complete a bike trail on it. It is a crucial link for commuters.
127	Increased Bike Trails: Please improve and create more bike trails using innovative approaches to make separate bike trails along the I-90 corridor from 405 to the Issaquah Highlands. Current trails are great in some places. In other places a bike commuter takes their life in their hands to commute in dangerous traffic. (It is so dangerous to cross 148th on a bike.) Any biker will come out much the worse for wear in an encounter with a moving vehicle. Since vehicles emit most of the Green House Gases in the region, making a more bike friendly environment would reduce those gases. Thanks.
128	Make a connecting trail from the Lost Meadow part of the Bellevue Botanical Gardens to Wilburton Park so we can walk our dogs and not have to walk around to the front of the garden.
129	Make W Lk Sammamish Pky safe for walking and biking. Top Priority!
130	Provide walking friendly parks. Bathroom facilites at larger parks w/multiple functions. Replace bark more often.
131	We definitely need more biking trails throughout Bellevue. We would love to bike to work, but it is extremely difficult with the traffic and no bike lanes.
132	We MUST be providing linkages for our City's residents about how these public spaces affect our shared environment beyond the park and residential areas (ex: streams, ponds, lakes and the Sound). Walking and biking are KEY parts of our rapidly-needed transition to sustainable communities that might include shared garden space. That's as important and valid an 'outdoor exercise' as running around or firing up polluting jet skis that our parks currently bend over to accomodate.

133	Although i am not a resident, i work in Bellevue (Eastgate). My co-workers and i take great joy in a stroll thorough parks during lunch and breaks. one plot of land that was the old landfill was purchasaed by the parks i believe. There is construction underway that severely limits our access to the open land that we used to walk through. I imagine that our office building pays property taxes that goes towards these parks. With several thousand more employees coming down this street,it would be nice to have a space larger than Spirit Ridge Park to go to for lunch and strolls.
134	More emphasis on bike paths away from street traffic. Connecting the parks through pathing that does not intersect with automobile routes.
135	As more and more of Bellevue is developed the importance of natural open areas becomes an urgent focus. It is critical to maintain and finish the current parks without developing new ones. Wild areas are an important factor in the health of a city and its inhabitants (human and others!)
136	Please preserve natural areas in the city. The Bellefiels Nature Park is a great example to get away from the hustle and bustle of city life if even for an hour.
137	reclaim waterfront
138	a public park which incorporates the natural environment, i.e ponds, grasses and beach type environment are outstanding. I have worked on the design of parks in west seattle which are successful in that nature and would like to see more in Bellevue. An outdoor pool like kirkland would be ideal.
139	As Bellevue grows and becomes this large city, I think they should consider purchasing open space for a future park/events area in the Bellevue East area between Bell/Red. Rd. and 520.
140	Bellevue can be very proud of its parks and how they preserve the natural beauty of the Pacific Northwest. They are lovely and provide an inviting resource for our community. Park as defined by Webster: "A piece of ground in or near a city or town kept for ornament and recreation. An area maintained in its natural state as a public property." Bellevue is fortunate to have a large number of native species within the Meydenbauer Bay and other areas - - let's hold onto them! How many urban areas can boast eagles, cormorants, herons, beaver, otter, muskrat and a salmon spawning stream! "
141	Bellevue needs to create more Parks that are natural in character. Simple, low maintenance open spaces that are open to a variety of passive uses like walking, flying kites, playing frisbee, or playing fetch with a dog. Bellevue has an abundance of "over developed parks" that cater to single user groups and require expensive maintenance. Manicured lawns, intricate landscaping, and sports fields dominated the Bellevue Park system. The only parks that have been spared this fate are wetlands. Acres and acres of such Parks are "off-limits" to citizens who don't participate in one sport or another. If walking trails are included in these parks, they are seldom used because those parks are noisy and crowded when in use, and have the ambience of a prison yard when not in use. Can't we find a way to consolidate sports activities in the many existing fields that are on school grounds and in the sports parks we already have? About one third of Bellevue households own dogs, but less than 2 acres has been provided as a place for those citizens to exercise their dogs. Can't we do better than this? <u>Whv can't we have some natural parks which include areas where dogs can be exer</u>
142	Considering the high level of infill development going on in Bellevue; targeting and purchasing future park properties and or connecting existing walking and biking trials should be a high priority.
143	Create a specific list of projects that will be funded in a new parks bond and stick to it. Don't put out a list of 10 "possible" sites (projects), and then only fund 5 with the money. Be clear about what the money will fund. Provide trails and open space with a natural habitat (native, drought tolerant plant species) in the Downtown and in the Bel-Red "rezone". Provide for wildlife (food(berries), shelter, tree canopy) in these areas.
144	Enjoy the natural settings

145	I enjoy birdwatching and would encourage the council to consider different habitats and ecosystems when maintaining and expanding the park system. My favorite parks are Mercer Slough and Juanita Bay. At Mercer Slough I wish there was a map of the trails available at the kiosk to take as you walk. Also consider adequate parking for the park usage. It is unclear to me where to park legally for entry to Mercer Slough from the eastside of the park.
146	It is incredibly important that Bellevue do it's part in addressing climate change. This means leaving as much tree cover in the city, on public AND private land, as possible. Areas of contiguous habitat for wildlife is also extremely important. Not every park has to have active recreation. Do not sacrifice natural areas for more soccer fields!! When I moved to Bellevue as a youngster in 1968, I was awestruck by the feeling of being in the woods even in the city. This is what brings people to Bellevue and keeps them here. Sacrificing neighborhood character and natural areas for short term economic gain is extremely short sighted. I support the efforts you have made in this direction and encourage you to do much more.
147	More natural habitat
148	My priority is to keep natural space to protect our watershed and indigenous species. Bike paths nears streets are fine and some footpaths to allow for birdwatching would be nice. But, please, don't overdevelop. A restroom at Ardmore Park would be nice.
149	Preserve land and open space. That is SO valuable to ALL property in Bellevue and around. PLEASE acquire more land for parks and nature conservation.
150	Preserving natural areas and open space is key to your goal of environmental stewardship. With all the development, this is not the Bellevue we chose to live in decades ago. We are concerned about the possibility of major building construction in the precious parks, such as plans to build a 250-person capacity visitors center at Bellevue Botanical Garden. We would like to see the Parks Department work more closely with other city departments and coordinate with local schools and other public agencies. Item 4k is a great idea. I would also like to see a parks naturalist (or perhaps a cooperative arrangement with local universities) to evaluate wildlife habitat in Bellevue Parks. Please set a goal for increasing the tree canopy in the park system. Parks could lead the way in demonstrating best practices for protecting the environment, from the way parks are maintained (try to eliminate gas-powered blowers and vehicles) to innovative ways to reduce impervious surface. As a first step, recycling bins would be a great way to make your commitment to the environment clear. <u>The entire park system needs to be evaluated as a whole to see how the parks work together. Goals</u>
151	There are so many undeveloped, wooded areas in Bellevue. I'd like to see these protected from future development and turned into parks. I don't want any growth cut down except for the purpose of cutting minimally invasive biking/walking trails through the areas.
152	50M pool, Shelters by turf fields like Marymoor
153	a larger community pool to be built that will be able to accommodate all the high schools and will have the starting blocks needed for swim team. Also water polo
154	A new aquatics facility needs to be built for many reasons. There are many teams around the area that need and would use the facility year-round. For example, the Newport High School Swim Team practices at Newport Hills Swim and Tennis Club, where they have to practice outside even in the bistering cold, and some have gotten sick. There is limited pool time there, and it's used for a lot of other things. If a new one was built, it could be used for this piurpose and for other activities for people to participate in.
155	A new swimming facility would be great. Bellevue Aquatics is small, out dated and very dirty.
156	A world class city that we live in must have a world class aquatic center for schools, citizens and those employed in Bellevue can enjoy. The city schools and neighborhoods have a tradition of outstanding swimming and waterpolo teams. My children partisipated in these activities at Newport High School, their home pool was on Mercer Island and they practiced at Newport Hills Club outdoors all year long. I'm sure the citizens will financially support a new city owned aquatic center. My Regards. Mike Molnar
157	Additional aquatics facilities. Additional tennis courts and parking at Robinswood.

158	Am aware that the Bellevue AC is not large enough to accomodate all of the high schools swimming programs. Would like to see city address this by accessing existing pools (renting time etc.) for use or building another facility.
159	Another warm-water indoor swimming pool would get a lot of use and would be much appreciated. We love our parks and we're looking forward to the water-play park at Crossroads. I hope the water will be warm enough for really little kids to enjoy.
160	Bellevue needs an indoor swim facility for the school swim teams to use. It is ridiculous that a city like Bellevue the kids practice outside in the Winter while Renton, Issaquah, Kirkland and even Seattle have indoor pools!
161	Bellevue very much needs a swimming facility that can support swim meets and community swim programs.
162	Build an aquatics facility.
163	Build new indoor swimming pools
164	Build the SPLASH pools. If you build a world class swimming facility, then Bellevue would become a destination place. Just like Water Mania in Richmond BC.
165	First priority should be a new indoor swimming complex. Full size competition pool for high school and summer use, diving pool for competiton and recreation, shallow pool for lessons and exercise class.
166	I am a supporter of the parks system and would change my answer to question two to "nearly every day" if there was a swimming pool added to the system. I am in contact with SPLASH and feel there is a dire need for a natatorium. Please consider all of the wonderful benefits of a pool in Bellevue when thinking about improving the city.
167	I am extremely interested in the City developing an indoor aquatics facility that can be used by the high schools, local club swim teams and water polo teams for practice and competitive events and can also have programs for the general public.
168	I believe a larger swimming facility that can accommodate our high schools is necessary. Right now there is not enough capacity and we cannot have a "home" meet.
169	I feel that for a city as affluent as Bellevue, there should have a first class aquatic facility for both competitions, family and community programs. our current Bellevue aquatic facility is unable to accomplish that. This could ultimately be a destination for many teams and programs thereby enhancing our beautiful city even more and possibly bring additional revenue to our city
170	I own a business in Bellevue, have employees who live in Bellevue & would like to see the Parks system expanded to included a pool for the High schools that would be large enough to hold district type meets. There could be use during the day for senior programs.The need for an indoor facility in the community is great & needs to be adressed. Thanks, Bruce Kelly
171	I strongly support a new aquatics center for Bellevue, to help our residents stay healthy and active. Such a facility could leverage private donations, also; I would personally donate to get one built if the city took the lead. My second priority would be improvements to the Bellevue Botanical Garden -- it's a world-class garden that could use a new Visitors Center to match the rest of the site.
172	I would like to see another indoor pool for lap swimming, general recreation, for swim meets & with a component for seniors.
173	I would like to see more public pools. Possibly at local highschools which would also be available to the public.
174	I would really like to see more indoor pools to accomadate swim, dive and water polo teams.
175	In addition, a new aquatic facility would be very beneficial to the community. Local high school swim and water polo teams often have to practice outdoors, in the cold, and in the early morning because no other times are available for them. Also, with no home pool, home meets must be held at an away pool, often late at night, which is an incovenience to everyone. An aquatic facility would also provide a safe, fun, gathering place for people of all ages, from toddlers to teens to seniors. Swimming is a lifelong sport, with many health benefits.

176	King County is dreadfully lacking adequate pool facilities for swim instruction, recreation and high school and club swim teams. Few school districts have pools. Neighborhood pools are old, small and often only open in the summer. We need a pool complex to meet the needs of our community -- of all ages!
177	My suggestion is to partner up with Bellevue School District in determining a location for indoor aquatic pool (similar in size to the one in Federal Way olympic pool) creating an outdoor skate/bike and basketball fields area.
178	My support would be dependent on making sure that the parks plan included funding for new aquatics facilities - to include a 50-meter Olympic competition size pool (along with a host of other amenities).
179	New Pool
180	Our aquatics options are extremely limited - we need funding for a new acquatics complex.
181	Please build the indoor pool facility (SPLASH) as your top priority. Swimming is an excellent sport. Our young high school athletes have to practice in outdoor pools before and after school. This is not healthy for our children but we are discouraging many to continue the wonderful sport of swimming. The Issaquah school district practices indoors. Bellevue should have the same opportunities for their students. Swimming is so GOOD for the body in SO many ways. Please build it soon.
182	Please give us one or more new public swimming facilities. We really need them, for everyone.
183	Please include funding for aquatics in any funding proposal. It is a shame for a rich city like Bellevue not to have a proper place for our teens to practice and compete. Early morning practice and late night meets are common for Bellevue District Schools.
184	Pool
185	Support the SPLASH effort to build an international class aquatic center in Bellevue
186	The area is in serious need of an Olympic sized aquatics center. KCAC is overbooked. The currently available pools are over 25 years old and unsafe. We have lived and competed in areas (Utah, Virginia, Missouri, California, Portland, Canada) where community centers contained multiple pools, a 50 m pool with 8 lanes (single depth), a 25 meter pool (graduated depth), and either a therapeutic pool with ramp and rail, or a 14 ft dive pool for 3 m board and above. Looking at the caliber of swimmers and water polo players in the area (many nationally ranked), it is a tragedy that they practise in such crowded conditions through out the year, many of them outdoors in order to get pool time.
187	The city definitely needs to put in more pools. Bellevue and Newport were third and fourth this year for girls swimming. Indoor pools are a necessary to keeping these programs alive!
188	The city desperately needs more aquatics facilities, both for competative athletic training and recreation. This area lags behind other areas in our state, and the nation, in the existence of quality aquatics facilities.
189	The city needs a competition pool to facilitate meets for our high schools. This is an issue that has to be addressed, our high school teams need to have a local facility to practice at, as well as hold competitions. Using local outdoor pools during the school year is not the answer, yet it is currently the only option for many teams in the area.
190	The city of Bellevue is in desperate need of an indoor pool facility that could service the Bellevue schools and also serve as a training facility for water sports of all kinds and therapy space for all.
191	The city of Bellevue needs to strongly support the Splash org. to build a new Aquatic center here in Bellevue. Practicing in a outside pool during october for high school swim is unacceptable and is a disgrace. Although this may not be your top priority as it seems all Bellevue high schools prtice outdoors for both boys waterpolo and girls swim, i see many boys and girls getting sick when they have to pracice in 50 or 40 degree weather, or in the rain and it is sad that Bellevue isn't taking immediate action.

192	The Eastside is in need of a public aquatic facility that is suitable for year-round recreational and competitive use. High school varsity aquatic teams are currently forced to utilize private community pools that are past the facilities' life expectancies. Children in more affluent neighborhoods have access to high quality private aquatic facilities while those in less affluent neighborhoods do not. Aquatics offer healthy, life-long activities that should be readily available to all segments of the population.
193	The indoor athletic facility should include a pool I'm thinking of a 'destination pool' with water slides, wave pool, running track, weights, lap pool and a warm pool for lessons and therapy... We need to provide indoor fun - the fields are great and well used. So many more people of all ages can use a pool facility all day and evening. thanks Tracy Bury
194	The region needs a competitive swimming facility able to host swim meets and other aquatic activities.
195	There is a notable lack of indoor swimming facilities in Bellevue. The development of a new indoor pool should be a priority as it would fill a need while providing a facility that could be used by people of all ages and economic backgrounds. A pool that meets the needs of seniors, recreational swimmers, families and competitive athletes is long overdue in this area.
196	We are in great need of an Aquatics center. My daughter swims at the High School level and it's ridiculous the pools that we have to use for the meets and for KingCo's, Districts and state. Bellevue needs a facility for our swimmers.
197	we need an aquatic facility!
198	We need another indoor pool! Also, a indoor soccer center would be a great addition (the closest ones are in Woodinville, Tukwila, or Redmond)
199	We need more swimming pools
200	We need to consider a public aquatic center for use by public, and school swim teams. Our High schoolers travel to Juanita and Mercer Island for their home swim meets and practice in private club pools. We have late night meets (starting at 7:45 pm and finishing as late as 10:30 pm), and sometimes early morning practices for our kids (starting at 5:00 am). A new Visitor Center needs to be supported for the Bellevue Botanical Garden. There is an incredible visitor base (not only city, but state, country and international visitors) and volunteer base that supports the garden. It's a place of refuge as well as lively activities for the preschooler through the elderly. More classes in horticulture, lights making and possibly even passive recreation would be, I believe, fully received and filled. Garden d'Lights hosted over 120,000 visitors alone in approx 6 weeks last year. With a new Visitor Center and more parking space, the City could have a new source of continuous revenue with rentals of rooms and/or a lecture hall.
201	We need to support and indoor pool facility for: our schools, all sports, seniors, families with small kids, those that can't afford an expensive club, Health needs for physical therapy and medical needs of the community. All council members need to support a great indoor pool in Bellevue!!!
202	We would love to see a new indoor pool built
203	Would like to see another more public pools. Out doors for summer indoors for winter. Need more public indoor tennis courts!
204	Add more sports fields.
205	Add sports fields

206	Athletic fields are in great need. Teams with huge waiting lists cannot be released because of a lack of practice fields. My oldest boy's team cannot practice on a full field. The first time that they encounter a full field situation is at a game. This is a great disadvantage. Girls lacrosse is very slow to develop because there are not fields. Mercer Island and Eastside both have very competitive and developed girls lacrosse. Bellevue girls lacrosse does not formally have a team until 7/8. Mercer Island and Eastside both start 3/4. I coached a great boys U9 soccer team this year, but we had only one official practice a week. I requested two but there weren't any field available for a second practice. I would call an informal practice over at the Medina dog park....oooh that was a doggie do disaster! We are supposed to have this very wealthy pop base, but our playing field sure don't show it. We certainly have all of the fancy stores but when we travel to other districts to play and wow their fields are nice. Ours look 4th rate, worn out - from over use and in cohesive compared to theirs.
207	Bellevue has really been lacking the availability of sports facilities from fields, courts, and pools. The schools have not supported the athletes. With our active students and community, we need to keep up and provide these facilities.
208	Build a large baseball complex like other cities. We could host baseball/softball tournaments and make money on the concessions. More indoor facilities like tennis courts.
209	Given the population growth very little has been done to meet the additional needs for sports fields. There is a real shortage that affects the children participating in sport and curtails involvement. If the city's intent is to limit youth participation in organized sports I think it should be reconsidered. Why would a city want to cut back on family participation oriented programs? These help with community values and a general sense of community. Please show your support for community activities and provide more sport fields.
210	I am a board member of Bellevue Youth Soccer and have 3 children that play various sports (soccer, baseball, lacrosse) in Bellevue. The availability and condition of the fields is extremely poor. It is particularly embarrassing when clubs from other eastside communities come to our area to play. I feel this should be a TOP priority!
211	I believe one of the most important matters to consider while contemplating new parks or improving existing parks is the fact that Bellevue critically lacks adequate facilities for athletic fields. While parks and open space are great, consideration needs to be made to include athletic/sports fields (or improvement of existing) in any and all future plans. It is truly a tragedy that we do not have adequate facilities in this wonderful City to meet the needs of our own club or school sponsored sports programs, and as a resident I would like to see this become a priority in any planning/upgrading or expanding of our parks system.
212	I don't like the idea of using park space for more soccer fields.
213	I would like the City to support the Bellevue athletic leagues so that they can afford to hire referees and people to set up the fields without charging too much.
214	I would love to see another turf field in Bellevue - namely Newport Hills Park or Wilburton. The use Robinswood is getting is phenomenal and we need another year round facility. In addition, I would love to see all the outdoor tennis courts at Robinswood available for indoor use year round, not just two of them.
215	I would only be interested in supporting the city on this if the city would show better support for little league. Bellevue little leagues pay almost \$70,000.00 annually in field fees and my opinion is that we don't get very much for our money. I think it is time that the city starts showing the community that kids sports programs are important by providing us with more facilities and better city care for the facilities we already own.

216	In these days and times when you can't let your kids go to parks alone one of the only ways to get kids out and about is in organized sports groups such as soccer, baseball, football etc. It is important to supply fields and places for these activities. For example, it was unfortunate that the city saw fit to post signs at Kilarney Glen that organized scrimmages of kids playing soccer was not allowed. Maintenance at some of the parks and school fields is pretty pathetic and it is embarrassing when we play soccer teams from other cities such as Issaquah and Mercer Is. and we have to apologize for the condition of our field when the fields we play on at their schools and parks were so nice. The school district was not interested in trying to fix up Chinook Middle schools field when help has been offered from the Bellevue Youth Soccer Club. We tried to patch it a little ourselves by filling the holes in the field to make it safer and the district got mad. All it took was a few pickup loads of dirt and an hour of parents time and the play surface was much better. Please work on the
217	Like to see field turf soccer and baseball field at Newport Hills Park. Field turf at Newport High School baseball fields that are being built, but with grass...Missed an opportunity here, but should correct in the future. The amount of use that could be obtained with field turf would help serve the needs of South Bellevue.
218	soccer programs in the area have outgrown the facilities .. more all weather/ turf facilities need to be provided to support the continued growth of this sport.this should be a priority for Bellevue parks as they fall behind other areas in providing for soccer space.. many kids and adults play outside Bellevue due to lack of facilities.
219	The questions above relate to the City of Bellevue as a whole. The City needs to recognize that south Bellevue does not have near the sports field infrastructure that other parts of the City have, even though we may have an equal number of residents. For example, within the area of Bellevue bounded on the south by I90 and on the west by I-405 there are at least 12 grass soccer fields and 2 new turf soccer fields (not including high schools). For the area of Bellevue south of I-90 there are only 2 grass soccer fields and one of these is so overused that it is essentially worthless after about October 15th. In addition to targeting new and better fields the City needs to recognize geographic disparities and seek to improve the playing fields in south Bellevue to bring them up to be equivalent with other parts of the City.
220	There simply are not enough quality soccer fields available - would like to see a functional partnership between Park Department and School District to free up fields for soccer both children and adults....
221	We need more athletic fields, especially west of 405 and north of I-90
222	We need more fields - my kids have played soccer, baseball and football at various times, and all the youth sports organizations are all short on fields . . . what can we do?
223	We need more multipurpose artificial turf fields that can be used for soccer/football & baseball. The Robinwood complex is a good start.
224	We need more parks dedicated to sports use, baseball and soccer fields. Turf fields would cut costs in the long run. The level of maintenance for fields used by Little League is pretty low based on what we spend for field use. Very little is done by the parks (maintenance) at the schools for Little League. There are 3 leagues using fields at a total cost of over \$70,000 for a 3-4 month period
225	We need more sports fields
226	West Bellevue is lacking in safe sports fields, specifically soccer fields. I support a complex similar to Robinwood in West Bellevue. Perhaps consider a synthetic turf at the Hidden Valley Sports complex that can be multi-use for softball/baseball and soccer, similar to what the City of Seattle has done with many of its facilities.
