Project Scoring: Roadway/Intersection

Scoring Criteria

1. Safety, 25%
2. Level of Service, 25%
3. Transit, 15%
4. Non-motorized, 20%
5. Plan Consistency & Outside Funding, 15%



Project Scoring: Ped/Bike

Three components to scoring criteria:

Safety, 35%

System Linkage, 35%

Land Use, 30%



Selection of Candidate Projects—Roadway/Intersection

Projects to be included on candidate list:

- a. Current, 2009-2020 TFP projects (includes current 2011-2017 CIP projects)
- b. Candidate projects evaluated for but not included in 2009-2020 TFP
- c. Projects from Eastgate/I-90 plan (the only new long-range plan)
- d. Projects needed to coordinate with Sound Transit East Link
- e. Emerging needs/opportunities identified by staff

Selection of Candidate Projects—Ped/Bike

Projects to be included on candidate list

- a. Current, 2009-2020 TFP projects (includes current 2011-2017 CIP projects)
- b. Projects from Eastgate/I-90 plan
- c. Pedestrian projects identified in the Ped-Bike Plan as “*high*” priority*
- d. Bicycle projects located on “*priority bicycle corridors*”*
- e. Projects identified to coordinate with Sound Transit East Link
- f. Emerging needs/opportunities identified by staff

*To be screened for current feasibility.


⇒ *Propose to evaluate smaller projects through a separate process.*

Smaller Ped/Bike Projects

Propose to use separate evaluation process.

- Large number of smaller projects
- Traditionally have not scored well in the TFP/CIP process
- Precedent is “Neighborhood Sidewalk Project” evaluation in 2007

Suggested criterion: Projects estimated to cost under \$1.5m follow the separate process.

I. Four Public Meetings in areas around the city

- Information about projects in neighborhood, as well as citywide.
- Opportunity to indicate preferences, comment on projects and priorities
- Specific outreach/accommodation per Title VI guidelines.

II. Web-based Survey (with paper option as well)

Features include:


- Map of projects, with link to descriptions,


