We encourage citizens to share with staff traffic safety concerns in their neighborhood. It is simple and easy.

- 1** Citizens submit a “Request for Action” describing the concern in detail.
- 2** Staff evaluate the concern through field visits, traffic data analysis, and citizen feedback.
- 3** A “Traffic Action Plan” listing recommendations to address traffic safety concerns is developed and shared with the neighborhood.
- 4** Together, citizens work with staff on implementing the “Traffic Action Plan” for their neighborhood.

# Traffic Safety Goals



## Manage Traffic Volume

Reduce the number of cut-through vehicles on a residential street



## Reduce Excessive Vehicle Speeds

Slow down vehicles through education, engineering, and enforcement efforts



## Enhance Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety

Create a more inviting place to walk and bike by decreasing vehicle speeds and managing traffic volume



## Enhance Neighborhood Identity

Heighten awareness of a neighborhood through signage and gateway treatments




## Educate the Community

Create awareness around traffic safety and encourage citizens to play an active role in addressing their neighborhood concerns through education programs



## Manage Neighborhood Parking

Address resident concerns with parking from businesses and schools spilling over into neighborhoods through parking restrictions such as Residential Permit Parking Zones



## *How are traffic safety concerns evaluated?*

Staff travel to the site and review traffic conditions. They may also conduct speed and volume counts and/or look at previous traffic studies as well as reported accidents. This information, along with the citizen's observations, will assist in developing a report. This report lists traffic analysis findings and recommendations for moving forward.

## ➔ **Traffic Safety Components**

Residents are often the first to know of traffic safety concerns in their neighborhood. As a resident, you are the eyes and ears for us providing information on traffic conditions. Whether you want to discourage excessive vehicle speeds, minimize cut-through traffic, reduce overflow parking and/or encourage walking and biking, we need you to be an active part to identify the problems, develop recommendations, and implement those recommendations.

The key to achieving our traffic safety goals is a strong resident-staff partnership throughout the three traffic safety components described below.

### **Education and Encouragement**

- City-sponsored information such as project newsletters and social media.
- Citizen-led efforts requiring a commitment of resident time to implement solutions—such as borrowing the radar dolly.

### **Modifying Streetscape**


- Physically changing the street environment through traffic safety projects that may include signing, parking restrictions, and pavement markings or traffic calming elements such as speed humps, raised crosswalks, and traffic circles.

### **Enforcement**

- Police enforcement of traffic and parking regulations.

## ***Frequently Asked Questions***

***I think a stop sign would solve speeding issues. Will the city install one in my neighborhood?***

Not likely. When stop signs are used as speed breakers, there is a high incidence of drivers intentionally running the stop sign. They are only installed where warranted.

***What about children at play signs?***

"Children at Play" signs do not increase a driver's attention to the point of reducing vehicle speeds or reducing pedestrian accidents. In fact, placement of these signs can increase the potential for accidents by conveying to children and parents a false sense of a protected area. Instead we encourage parents and children to find alternative places to play away from traffic, such as backyards, parks, and playgrounds.

***I would like to see more police enforcing the speed limit and issuing tickets. Can I request enforcement on my street?***

***Can the speed limit be lowered?***

Bellevue does not post speed limits below 25 mph. The only exception to this is elementary school zones where 20 mph is posted. Advisory speed limits below 25 mph (yellow and black signs) may be established near curves, grades, or other conditions to alert drivers to reduce their speed.
