BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSAL'S SCOPE AND NATURE:

1. **General description:** The proposal is to amend Chapter 24.06 of the Bellevue City Code (BCC) to implement mandatory regulations required by the federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit. Other amendments to Chapter 24.06 BCC include consistency updates with other City codes and standards, modifications to reflect current City practices, and substantive modifications relating to permit approval and enforcement actions.

The Environmental Service Commission will hold an Open House and Public Meeting on June 4, 2009 at City Hall, Room 1E-112. The open house will be held from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. and the public meeting will immediately follow the open house, in the same room. City Council final action on the proposal is anticipated on August 3, 2009.

Do you have any plans for future additions, expansion, or further activity related to or connected with this proposal? If yes, explain.

Additional code amendments to Chapter 23.76 BCC are required to implement mandatory regulations required by the federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit. Amendments to the Land Use Code are anticipated for the fall or winter of 2009 for consistency with the amendments contained in this proposal. Potential amendments to Chapter 1.18 BCC dealing with enforcement matters may be anticipated, as well.

SUMMARY

Project Summary: The proposal is to amend Chapter 24.06 of the Bellevue City Code (BCC) to implement mandatory regulations required by the federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit. Other amendments to Chapter 24.06 BCC include consistency updates with other City codes and standards, modifications to reflect current City practices, and substantive modifications relating to permit approval and enforcement actions.

Environmental Summary per WAC 197-11-235(3)(b):

State the proposal's objectives: To implement mandatory regulations required by the federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit and to provide consistency with current practices and other city codes and standards.

Specify the purpose and need to which the proposal is responding: Federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit.

State the major conclusions, significant areas of controversy and uncertainty: Although mandatory and non-discretionary, the Federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit requirements may be controversial since such regulations substantially modify existing practice and regulation of stormwater matters.

State the issues to be resolved, including the environmental choices to be made among alternative courses of action: The City is required to implement the requirements in the Federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit – thus no alternatives may be considered in regard to those amendments. The non-NPDES code amendments will require policy discussions by the Council although alternatives are not being proposed at this time.

State the impacts of the proposal, including any significant adverse impacts that cannot be mitigated: The proposal is a nonproject action which includes regulations to protect the environment from prohibited discharges and ensure compliance with the Federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit. There are no significant adverse impacts resulting from that action.

Describe any proposed mitigation measures and their effectiveness: No specific development is being approved with this proposal. No significant environmental impacts have been identified, therefore no mitigation measures are proposed. Future development under the provisions of the regulation will be subject to SEPA review, as well as to the City's existing development regulations.

1. **How would the proposal be likely to increase discharge to water; emissions to air; production, storage, or release of toxic or hazardous substances; or production of noise?**

The proposed code amendment will not increase the potential impacts to water, air and earth resources or noise production – rather this proposal serves to further protect impacts to water and earth resources.

The proposed code amendment will not increase the potential impacts to plants and animals.

No adverse impacts to energy or natural resources are anticipated.
