## DETERMINATION OF NON-SIGNIFICANCE

**PROPONENT:** Dr. Brett Fidler

**LOCATION OF PROPOSAL:** 1841 132<sup>nd</sup> Place SE

**DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSAL:** Application for Land Use approval to remove noxious invasive plants (primarily blackberry and English ivy) and debris on property with steep slopes and steep slope critical area buffers.

The Environmental Coordinator of the City of Bellevue has determined that this proposal does not have a probable significant adverse impact upon the environment. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is not required under RCW 43.21C.030(2)(C). This decision was made after the Bellevue Environmental Coordinator reviewed the completed environmental checklist and information filed with the Land Use Division of the Development Services Department. 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
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
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
