NAME & DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSAL:

Prune 6 Madrona trees and remove nine small Alder saplings in a Native Growth Protection Area (NGPA). Alder saplings will be replaced with 9 vine maples.

The Environmental Coordinator of the City of Bellevue has determined that this proposal does not have a probable significant adverse impact upon the environment.
