**LOCATION OF PROPOSAL:** 17215, 17225, 17235, and 17243 SE Cougar Mtn Dr



The Environmental Coordinator of the City of Bellevue has determined that this proposal does not have a probable significant adverse impact upon the environment. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is not required under RCW 43.21C.030(2)(C). This decision was made after the Bellevue Environmental Coordinator reviewed the completed environmental checklist and information filed with the Land Use Division of the Development Services Department. ## 1. General description:

17125, 17225, 17235 SE Cougar Mt Dr

The project proposes to construct a private access road to serve 3 lots (the "north lots", TPs 242405-9040, -9173, and -9023) owned by Dr. Hanssen on Cougar Mt just west of 173<sup>rd</sup> Ave SE. The lots were created by BLA 06-12835-LW in 2006. A fourth BLA lot (TP 252405-9017) just to the south subsequently received preliminary short plat approval (09-107524-LN). A vegetation management plan was partially implemented on the north lots during the past summer. The BLA, short plat and vegetation management plan were all supported by a comprehensive critical areas report (06-133666-LO).

The road is 20 feet wide and 150 feet long. It would be classified a private access road across TP 242405-9040 to within about 35 feet of the west property line. A driveway off the south side of the road would serve a future house on TP 9040, and a joint use driveway extending west from the road would serve future houses on the remaining two tax lots. Road grade is 15% max and a landing is provided at the intersection with Cougar Mt Dr SE.

Construction is constrained by steep site topography and adjacent native growth protection easements established by the LO. It is located in a "zone of activity" that will also accommodate the future houses.

Construction will include a private 12-inch storm drainage main and private 8-inch sewer main across all three lots to serve the future short plat on TP 9017. A 1000 CY stockpile will also be removed from TP 9017.


